

Trauma Informed Community: Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs)

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are stressful or traumatic events, including abuse and neglect. They may also include household dysfunction such as witnessing domestic violence or growing up with family members who have substance use disorders. ACEs are strongly related to the development and prevalence of a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including those associated with substance misuse.



Data was collected at kindergarten round-up from parents completing the 2022 Kindergarten Round-Up Survey. Questions from the survey that would indicate possible ACEs for the kids entering kindergarten are as follow:

- 36% surveyed reported their child is living with a parent or guardian who was divorced or separated.
- 18% surveyed reported that they have accessed a community support to help provide basic needs for their family.
- 5% parents reported that their children have witnessed a family member with a drug/alcohol problem.
- 3% parents reported that their children have witnessed violence in the home.
- 14% of children have experienced a parent that has been depressed (has decreased from 21% in 2020).




Table indicates Trauma; Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) as reported by parents in the 2022 kindergarten round-up survey.

County Wide Data Summary

The Parent Coalition of the Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative conducted a survey with parents attending kindergarten registration activities in our seven districts with the Montcalm Area Intermediate School District. This is the ninth year that Montcalm County has conducted this survey. The purpose was to identify strengths and concerns in the areas of health, early care and education, social-emotional development, basic physical needs, and family support. The following data are the results from the 2022 survey. Parents completed a questionnaire consisting of 30 questions as an optional part of the kindergarten registration process. Of the seven participating districts within the Montcalm Area ISD, there were 718 children that registered for Kindergarten prior to September 1st, of those 356 parents or 50% completed the survey.


Health

Quality healthcare improves a child's learning abilities; a child can focus better when he or she is healthy. This year's survey revealed the following information:


- 97% reported having some type of health insurance,
- 47% of them have government sponsored insurance,
- 48% have private insurance,
- 1% reported having Military insurance,
- Only 3% reported not having a doctor,
- 10% of entering kindergarteners have never been to the dentist (compared to 14% in 2021),
- 5% of homes where the child resides has at least one person who smokes,
- 11% report that their child takes a prescription medication.

Early Care and Education

Education of a child begins at birth not at age 4 or 5; research tells us having quality childcare and educational experiences are vital. 58% of children are reported to have been in childcare during their first five years of life due to parent employment. Families reported overwhelming satisfaction with their childcare providers. Reading is a priority to parents in Montcalm County with 92% of parents reporting they read to their child at least 1-3 times or more per week! 78% of parents surveyed reported their children attended some type of preschool programming. Of those children that attended preschool 63% were enrolled in a government-sponsored program such as Head Start, Great Start Readiness Program, and Early Childhood Special Education. 16% of Parents questioned felt that their child would need extra help with learning in kindergarten.




Social-emotional skills give children the self-confidence they need to build loving and supportive relationships all their lives. There were several questions in this survey designed to gather information regarding children's social emotional well-being. The behaviors that were identified as being of concern were, child gets nervous easily (this relates to anxiety, up from 27% in 2019 to 32% in 2022), child is more active than others (went up from 25% in 2019 to 27% in 2022), child has a short attention span (decreased from 17% in 2019 to 13% in 2022).



Basic Needs

Providing basic needs continues to be a struggle for many parents surveyed. 2% of families report being on unemployment (approximately 8 households) as compared to 2020 15% of families were on unemployment. 1% of families report that one member is earning a lower wage within the past year.




Family Support

Families in Montcalm County indicated that they are able to find information about how to get their children ready for kindergarten. Approximately 31% of respondents participated in some sort of early intervention program such as: Early Head Start, Early On, Playgroups, Library Programs, Public Health Nurses, or Infant Mental Health Services prior to kindergarten. 8% participated in some type of parenting classes or support group; 12% of parents actively use the Montcalm County Great Start website; 1% of parents participated in Parent Coalition; 24% of the children received free books from the Montcalm County Dolly Parton Imagination Library; and 4% of children participated in the Connections Program.

Carson City - Crystal Area Schools: 66 children registered for kindergarten; 7 parents (11%) completed the survey.

Parents Education

86% of mothers and 83% of fathers had a GED or higher. There were 14% of mothers and 17% of fathers that had some high school but had not completed high school.



Parents that reported medical and dental homes have been increasing since 2017; fewer people smoke in the home compared to last years' survey.





WHAT THE DATA SHOWS US:

- 18% of children aged birth to seventeen live in poverty. The state of MI is 17%
- 64% of students receive free or reduced school lunch assistance; a slight rise from 2020 at 62%. The state of MI is 52%
- 32% of Montcalm County mothers who gave birth did not receive appropriate health care in 2019. This is a slight improvement from the last 6 years and a continued positive trend for mothers & babies in Montcalm County.
- Medicaid pays for 42% of Montcalm County births. State average: 40%. This remained consistent from last year.
- 70% of 19-35-month age children in Montcalm County are up to date on their immunizations. This is an area we have remained higher than the state average; however, we continue to dip each year in this area as compared to the last 4 years. The State average is 69%.
- 53% of children ages 0-4 are participating in Women, Infant, & Children (WIC). The state average is 44%. We have remained consistent in this area as well as in the State of MI.
- Montcalm County is higher than the state average in the rate of children birth to five
 that were substantiated for child abuse and neglect. Montcalm County stands at 21%
 while the state average is at 17%. The last two years have been a downward trend.
 Even though Montcalm communities are higher than the sat average we are moving
 in the right direction
- 321 birth to five children were served through Early ON & Special Education services
 in the calendar year of 2021. 4% of our three to five age children were receiving
 special education services and 4% of our birth to three age children were receiving
 Early On services.
