

Trauma Informed Community: Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs)

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are stressful or traumatic events, including abuse and neglect. They may also include household dysfunction such as witnessing domestic violence or growing up with family members who have substance use disorders. ACEs are strongly related to the development and prevalence of a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including those associated with substance misuse.



Data was collected at kindergarten round-up from parents completing the 2023 Kindergarten Round-Up Survey. Questions from the survey that would indicate ACEs for the kids entering kindergarten are as follow:

- 35% surveyed reported their child is living with a parent or guardian who was divorced or separated.
- 15% surveyed reported that they have accessed community support to help provide basic needs for their family.
- 3% of parents reported that their children have witnessed a family member with a drug/alcohol problem.
- 2% of parents reported that their children have witnessed violence in the home.
- 8% of children have experienced a parent that has been depressed (has decreased from 21% in 2020).




Table indicates Trauma; Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) as reported by parents in the 2023 kindergarten round-up survey.

County Wide Data Summary

The Parent Coalition of the Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative conducted a survey with parents attending kindergarten registration activities in our seven districts with the Montcalm Area Intermediate School District. This is the tenth year that Montcalm County has conducted this survey. The purpose was to identify strengths and concerns in the areas of health, early care and education, social-emotional development, basic physical needs, and family support. The following data are the results from the 2023 survey. Parents completed a questionnaire consisting of 30 questions as an optional part of the kindergarten registration process. Of the seven participating districts within the Montcalm Area ISD, there were 741 children that registered for Kindergarten prior to September 1st, of those 309 parents or 42% completed the survey.


Health

Quality healthcare improves a child's learning abilities; a child can focus better when he or she is healthy. This year's survey revealed the following information:


- 93% reported having some type of health insurance,
- 33% of them have government sponsored insurance,
- 53% have private insurance,
- 6% reported having Military insurance,
- Only 1% reported not having a doctor,
- 13% of entering kindergarteners have never been to the dentist,
- 7% of homes where the child resides has at least one person who smoked and/or vaped,
- 8% report that their child takes a prescription medication.

Early Care and Education

Education of a child begins at birth not at age 4 or 5; research tells us having quality childcare and educational experiences are vital. 54% of children are reported to have been in childcare during their first five years of life due to parent employment. Families reported overwhelming satisfaction with their childcare providers. Reading is a priority to parents in Montcalm County with 92% of parents reporting they read to their child at least 1-3 times or more per week! 66% of parents surveyed reported their children attended some type of preschool programming. Of those children that attended preschool 52% were enrolled in a government-sponsored program such as Head Start or the Great Start Readiness Program. 17% of Parents questioned felt that their child would need extra help with learning in kindergarten.




Social-emotional skills give children the self-confidence they need to build loving and supportive relationships all their lives. There were several questions in this survey designed to gather information regarding children's social emotional well-being. The behaviors that were identified as being of concern were, child gets nervous easily (this relates to anxiety, up from 27% in 2019 to 33% in 2023), child is more active than others (went down from 25% in 2019 to 24% in 2023), child has a short attention span (decreased from 17% in 2019 to 15% in 2023).



Basic Needs

Providing basic needs continues to be a struggle as Montcalm County has 32% of families identified as Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE). 4% of families report being on unemployment (approximately 11 households) as compared to 2020 15% of families were on unemployment. 1% of families report that one member is earning a lower wage within the past year.



Family Support


Families in Montcalm County indicated that they could find information about how to get their children ready for kindergarten. Approximately 38% of respondents participated in some sort of early intervention program such as: Early Head Start, Early On, Playgroups, Library Programs, Public Health Nurses, or Infant Mental Health Services prior to kindergarten. 6% participated in some type of parenting classes or support group; 11% of parents actively use the Montcalm County Great Start website; 2% of parents participated in Parent Coalition; 26% of the children received free books from the Montcalm County Dolly Parton Imagination Library; and 3% of children participated in the Connections Program.



Carson City - Crystal Area Schools: 50 children registered for kindergarten; 13 parents (26%) completed the survey.

Parents Education

85% of mothers and 82% of fathers had a GED or higher. There were 15% of mothers and 18% of fathers that had some high school but had not completed high school.



Health

46% had some type of government-funded insurance. 8% of respondents reported that their child takes a prescription medication.

8% of the respondents indicated that at least one person smoked and/or vaped in the home.

Parents that reported being a medical and dental household has been staying consistent since 2017.

WHAT THE DATA SHOWS US:

- 18% of children ages birth to seventeen live in poverty. State of MI is 18%.
- 65% of students receive free or reduced school lunch assistance; a rise from 2019 at 60%. State of MI is 53%.
- 29% of Montcalm County mothers who gave birth did not receive appropriate health care in 2021. This is an improvement since 2018. The State of MI is 32%.
- Medicaid paid for 39% of Montcalm County births in 2021. State of Mi is 39%.
- 66% of 19–35-month age children in Montcalm County are up to date on their immunizations. The State average is 68%. This is the first time in over 10 years Montcalm County has fallen below the state average.
- 50% of children ages 0-4 are participating in Women, Infant, & Children (WIC). State of MI is 42%. Data from the five plus years shows a declining enrollment trend despite being above the state average.
- Montcalm County is higher than the state average in the number of children birth to
 five that were substantiated for child abuse and neglect. Montcalm County stands at
 16% while the state average is at 17%. This is the first time in the last five years that
 Montcalm County has been below the state average and the trajectory moving in the
 positive direction.
- 330 birth to five children were served through Early ON & Special Education services in the 2022. This number has risen from 205 children in 2018. 11% of the 330 identified children were consistently receiving special education services in 2022.


