2024-2025 Preschool recruitment continues, and applications are being processed and distributed as they come in for 2024-2025! We appreciate any help you can provide in helping us connect families to programs with openings! On March 1st, 2025, we will officially begin GSRP enrolment season for 2025-2026 school year. If you know of any families with 4-year-olds for next school year please encourage them to complete an application. We will once again be enrolling (confirming) GSRP placement starting March 1st, 2025, in order to be able to give families the answers for placement that they are in need of for planning for the 2025-2026 school year! Working with hold harmless number so anticipating at least 26 classrooms operating. Because we have hold harmless in place programs should be able to tell families of their placement options instead of waiting until July!

Michigan Educator Workforce Initiative: CDA, Bachelors, and potentially master's degree support is available to staff who are working in/at any level of Early Childhood and or education. National Childcare data released last week: average cost of childcare in US is \$11,582 for one child.

2-1-1 Day February 11th, 2025: We really could use your help promoting 211. Access continues to come up as a priority in our local data sets. 211 can help families access a variety of service and supports! 2-1-1 social media and other marketing tools were sent out and can be resent if needed! MCGSC Executive Committee

More Parent Engagement and Need Local Accessibility to Support is needed. Why do we think this is occurring?

- Trying to live difficult to think of next steps.
- Lack of awareness of what's available.
- Comfortable behind a computer screen, not wanting to go to in person training/opportunities.
 - More convenient for virtual appointments.
 - Accept technology for everyday part of our lives.
- Once the child gets to school things will be fine, do not understand what is needed for the child prior; lack of understanding of child development.
- Substance misuse.
- Rising mental health issues with out mental health supports/ mental health provider desert.

Children in Montcalm County Lack Access to Local Resources for Healthy Early Childhood Development. Why do we think this is occurring?

- Affordability getting from point a to point b. Lack of reliable transportation.
- Lack of self-motivation to want a job/keep a job.
- Acceptance of generational poverty.
- Mental Health specific: Social workers are constantly changing, and it is difficult to keep track of resources.
- Only using the resources that are convenient to you within walking/driving distance (resources in your own small communities).
- Resources are not available for those in rural isolation.
- Awareness of the cost of items keeps things out of reach for families (childcare, food, vehicles, misc.)
- Childcare desert creates lack of job opportunities for parents.
- High ALICE population. People working but still having difficulty making ends meet.
- Lack of home visiting options; only qualifying options available yet so many more have needs.

Children are not Prepared for Kindergarten. Why do we think this is occurring?

- Childcare is expensive. Preschool options are limited in many rural areas.
- No 3-year-old spots/no options locally.
- Kindergarten is no longer developmentally appropriate.
- Lost play based focus for kindergarten.
- Mix messaging around kindergarten readiness.
- Increased need for social emotional issues /supports.
- Lack of knowledge among teachers about Developmentally appropriate practices.
- Disconnect between PreK and K12 interferes with k-12 readiness supports
- Lack of knowledge with parents in assisting their child with their homework, especially math

MCGSC Family Coalition

More Parent Engagement and Need Local Accessibility to Supports

- Coalition and Early On need to communicate. Especially for Family Coalition and that way people will know what is happening in the county.
- Evening meetups (think about working parents) would love more of them to happen. 5 votes
- Facebook events (Social Media & calendar resources) that are happening in Montcalm County 8 votes
- Share flyers at chambers, libraries, flo's, everywhere. 3 votes
- Have activities for older kids not just for preschool and under. 6 votes
- Share about Alpha Family Services and Maternal Infant Health Program. 3 votes.
- Spread the word about local resources. Many people don't know about the resources that are out there. 3 votes

Children in Montcalm County Lack Access to Local Resources for Healthy Early Childhood Development

- Partner with local farmers (classes about growing crops, how to plant, cook, store) Could even involve 4-H. 10 votes
- Have a community garden even at a senior citizen home. 15 votes
- More local farmers for EBT. 1 vote
- Many places that don't know for families for summer bucks at farmer markets
- School & MCGSC connection: Let schools know about events and that way they can share with their families: looks like sending flyers to secretaries at the elementaries) 1 vote
- Farmers Market gears toward children. Families sign up and each family will sign up to grow a fruit or vegetable and let the kids run it. Parents will be around to help their child(ren) and guide them. Families will be able to teach each other on how to plant the item and give ideas for recipes as well. They will be teaching each other. 6 votes

Children are not Prepared for Kindergarten

- A book/resource tool that helps parents prepare the child about Kindergarten that way they are ready and not behind. 5 votes
- Oriental Trading has so much stuff for learning materials! Even signing up for emails they will send you coupons or money and it will even make the items cheaper. 6 votes
- Possibly having the child wait to go to school till the age of 6 then starting them at the age of

Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative Status of Young Children 2025

Dear Community Member,

The Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative (MCGSC) is proud to support Early Childhood initiatives. We continue to drive conversations around the data that identifies the work we need to do to build a system that supports the wellbeing of all young children throughout Montcalm County. Please share our annual Status of Young Children report to grow the opportunities for conversations around the MCGSC vision. As partners in our community, we ask that you continue to advocate for young children and their families to be a priority. We know that the first five years of a child's life is a time of great opportunity! Research tells us that by age six, most of a child's brain is developed. This is a critical time for investments that stimulate brain development and build environments where young children thrive. In 2022, there were 697 births and a total of 2023 children birth to age eight living in Montcalm County. We must continue to make decisions that help families to raise healthy children prepared to succeed in school and life.

Parents and community leaders in Montcalm County who understand the vital importance of investing in young children continue to work together to implement the 2022-2025 MCGSC Strategic Plan. WHAT THE DATA SHOWS US:

- In 2023, 18% of children ages birth to seventeen live in poverty. State of MI is 17%.
- 57% of students receive free or reduced school lunch assistance, a decrease from 2023 at 67%. State of MI is 50%.
- 31% of Montcalm County mothers who gave birth did not receive appropriate health care in 2022. The State of MI is 31%.
- Medicaid paid for 38% of Montcalm County births in 2022. State of MI is 39%.
- 66% of 19—to 35-month-old children in Montcalm County are up to date on their immunizations. The State average is 70%. Unfortunately, this number is trending in the wrong direction.
- 47% of children ages 0-4 participate in Women, Infants, & Children (WIC). State of MI is 42%. Data from the last five-plus years shows a decreasing enrollment trend despite being above the state average.
- In 2023, Montcalm County was lower than the state average in the number of children birth to five that were substantiated for child abuse and neglect. Montcalm County stands at a rate per 1,000 of 14, while the state average is at a rate per 1,000 of 15.8.
- 140 ages birth to two children were served through Early ON & Special Education services in 2023. This number has increased from 112 children in 2020. Children from birth to 5 years old receiving special education in Michigan and Montcalm County was at 5%.

- 34 of 149 (22%) students receiving Early On are ALSO receiving special education services (Michigan Mandated Special Education MMSE).

Next year:


