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

Trauma Informed Community: Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs)

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are stressful or traumatic events, including abuse and neglect. They may also include household dysfunction such as witnessing domestic violence or growing up with family members who have substance use disorders. ACEs are strongly related to the development and prevalence of a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including those associated with substance misuse.



Data was collected at kindergarten round-up from parents completing the 2025 Kindergarten Round-Up Survey. Questions from the survey that would indicate ACEs for the kids entering kindergarten are as follows:

- 35% of respondents surveyed reported their child is living with a parent or guardian who was divorced or separated.
- 35% of respondents surveyed reported that they have accessed community support to help provide basic needs for their family.
- 1% of parents reported that their children have witnessed a family member with a drug/alcohol problem.
- 1% of parents reported that their children have witnessed violence in the home.
- 25% of children have experienced a parent that has been depressed.




Table indicates Trauma; Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) as reported by parents in the 2024 kindergarten round-up survey.

County Wide Data Summary

The Family Coalition of the Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative conducted a survey with parents attending kindergarten registration activities in our seven districts within the Montcalm Area Intermediate School District. This is the **eleventh year** that Montcalm County has conducted this survey. The purpose was to identify strengths and concerns in the areas of health, early care and education, social-emotional development, basic physical needs, and family support. The following data are the results from the 2025 survey. Parents completed a questionnaire consisting of 30 questions as an optional part of the kindergarten registration process. Of the seven participating districts within the Montcalm Area ISD, there were 624 children that registered for Kindergarten prior to September 1st, of those 309 parents or 50% completed the survey. This survey provides a snapshot of data points that guide Early Childhood system building initiatives in Montcalm County.


<u>Health</u>

Quality healthcare improves a child's learning abilities; a child can focus better when he or she is healthy. This year's survey revealed the following information:


- 98% reported having some type of health insurance,
- 45% of them have government sponsored insurance,
- 51% have private insurance,
- 1% reported having Military insurance,
- None of the respondents reported **not** having a doctor,
- 1% of kindergarteners have never been to the dentist,
- 9% of homes where the child resides have at least one person who smoked and/or vaped,
- 16% report that their child takes a prescription medication.

Early Care and Education

Education of a child begins at birth not at age 4 or 5; research tells us having quality childcare and educational experiences are vital. 46% of children are reported to have been in childcare during their first five years of life due to parent employment. Families reported overwhelming satisfaction with their childcare providers. Reading is a priority for parents in Montcalm County with 96% of parents reporting they read to their child at least 1-3 times or more per week! 90% of parents surveyed reported that their children attended some type of preschool programming. Of those children that attended preschool 73% were enrolled in a government-sponsored program such as Head Start or the Great Start Readiness Program. 15% of Parents questioned felt that their child would need extra help with learning in kindergarten.




Social-emotional skills give children the self-confidence they need to build loving and supportive relationships all their lives. There were several questions in this survey designed to gather information regarding children's social emotional well-being. The behaviors that were identified as being of concern were, child gets nervous easily (this relates to anxiety, up from 27% in 2019 to 33% in 2025), child is more active than others (went up from 25% in 2019 to 30% in 2025), child has a short attention span (increased from 17% in 2019 to 21% in 2025). Across the board data in areas of social emotional development have been increasing since the COVID-19 pandemic.



Basic Needs

Providing basic needs continues to be a struggle as Montcalm County has 54% of families identified as Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE). 2% of families report being on unemployment (approximately 16 households), 5% of families were unemployed. 4% of families report that one member is earning a lower wage within the past year.


Family Support

Families in Montcalm County indicated that they could find information about how to get their children ready for kindergarten. 64% of respondents participated in some sort of early intervention program such as: Early Head Start, Early On, Playgroups, Library Programs, Public Health Nurses, or Infant Mental Health Services prior to kindergarten. 11% participated in some type of parenting classes or support group; 30% of parents actively use the Montcalm County Great Start website; 4% of parents participated in Family Coalition; 59% of the children received free books from the Montcalm County Dolly Parton Imagination Library; and 7% of children participated in the Connections Program.

Carson City - Crystal Area Schools: 48 children registered for kindergarten; 4 parents (8%) completed the survey.

75% of mothers and 100% of fathers had a GED or higher. There was no reporting of parents that had some high school but had not completed high school.





The Montcalm County Great Start Collaborative (MCGSC) is proud to support Early Childhood initiatives. We continue to drive conversations around the data that identifies the work we need to do to build a system that supports the wellbeing of all young children throughout Montcalm County. Please share our annual Status of Young Children report to grow the opportunities for conversations around the MCGSC vision. We know that the first five years of a child's life is a time of great opportunity! Research tells us that by age six, most of a child's brain is developed. This is a critical time for investments that stimulate brain development and build environments where young children thrive. In 2022, there were 697 births and a total of 2023 children birth to age eight living in Montcalm County. We must continue to make decisions that help families to raise healthy children prepared to succeed in school and life.

Parents and community leaders in Montcalm County who understand the vital importance of investing in young children continue to work together to implement the 2022-2025 MCGSC Strategic Plan. WHAT THE DATA SHOWS US:

- In 2023, 18% of children ages birth to seventeen live in poverty. State of MI is 17%.
- 57% of students receive free or reduced school lunch assistance, a decrease from 2023 at 67%. State of MI is 50%.
- 31% of Montcalm County mothers who gave birth did not receive appropriate health care in 2022. The State of MI is 31%.
- Medicaid paid for 38% of Montcalm County births in 2022. State of MI is 39%.
- 66% of 19—to 35-month-old children in Montcalm County are up to date on their immunizations. The State average is 70%. Unfortunately, this number is trending in the wrong direction.
- 47% of children ages 0-4 participate in Women, Infants, & Children (WIC). State of MI is 42%. Data from the last fiveplus years shows a decreasing enrollment trend despite being above the state average.
- In 2023, Montcalm County was lower than the state average in the number of children birth to five that were substantiated for child abuse and neglect. Montcalm County stands at a rate per 1,000 of 14, while the state average is at a rate per 1,000 of 15.8.
- 140 ages birth to two children were served through Early ON & Special Education services in 2023. This number has
 increased from 112 children in 2020. Children from birth to 5 years old receiving special education in Michigan and
 Montcalm County was at 5%.
